

EFFINGHAM is a parish and village $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Leatherhead, 8 from Guildford, and $4\frac{1}{2}$ from Dorking station, on the Upper London road, between Guildford and Leatherhead. It is in the Hundred of Copthorne and Effingham, Dorking Union, West Surrey, and Winchester bishopric. It contains 3,148 acres, and a popu-

lation of 618. The manors in this parish are Effingham-le-Legh, Effingham, and East court; besides which, part of the parish is in the manor of Byfleet, and other parts are in the manor of Little Bookham and East and West Horsley. The living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Queen, in the deanery of Stoke, with a glebe house, valued £226

per annum. The old part of the church is built with flints, and covered with stones and slates; the west part of the tower was rebuilt with bricks in 1757, the old steeple having fallen down: the tower is embattled. The interior consists of a nave and chancel. The great tithes are £414; small,

£120. Here is a school, supported by the clergyman, the Rev. Henry Malthus, M.A., and the gentry of the parish. Effingham was formerly a place of importance, and is said to have had 16 churches, but without any adequate foundation. It gives name to the Hundred.
