

EFFINGHAM is a parish and pleasant scattered village, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles west-south-west from Leatherhead, 8 east-north-east from Guildford, and $4\frac{1}{2}$ north-west from Dorking, on the Upper London road, between Guildford and Leatherhead: it is in the Western division of the county, and gives name to the hundred of Effingham, in Dorking union and county court district, Surrey archdeaconry, Leatherhead rural deanery, and Winchester diocese. The old part of the church of St. Lawrence is built of flints, and covered with stones and slates: the west part of the tower was rebuilt of brick in 1757, the old steeple having fallen down; the tower is embattled: it has a chancel, nave, and south transept, and stained east window. The register, in good preservation, dates from 1565. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £400, with residence, in the gift of Cosmo Bonsor, esq. and held by the Rev. Henry Malthus, M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge. Here is a small Wesleyan chapel, built in 1854. H. Smith's charity of £11 yearly is for bread. The manors in this parish are Effingham-le-Legh, Effingham, and East Court; besides which, part of the parish is in the manor of Byfleet, and other parts are in

the manor of Little Bookham and East and West Horsley. Lady Caroline Maxse and Capt. Evelyn Latimer Parratt (lady and lord of the manors) and the Earl of Lovelace are principal landowners. The soil is a light marl; subsoil, chalk and gravel. The chief crops are wheat, barley and oats. The area is 3,183 acres; rateable value, £4,533, and the population in 1871 was 506.
