

# A GREEK WEDDING.

## MALANDRINOS—HOUSE.

The Greek Church (St. Nicholas) was the scene of a picturesque wedding yesterday, when Miss Kathleen House, daughter of the late Mr. Frederick House, was married to Mr. Andrea Basil Malandrinos (Vice-Consul for Greece), son of Mr. Basil Andrea Malandrinos (Consul-General for Greece in Liverpool). The church was beautifully decorated with spring flowers and giant palms, which shined with artistic effect in the light of numerous candles. The singing was by a splendidly-trained male choir under the conductorship of Mr. W. Robertson, and was unaccompanied by any musical instrument.

The ceremony was performed by the Most Rev. Archimandrite Nichiforos Viannoulis, D.D., and the duties of best man were efficiently carried out by Mr. Theodore Casdagli (Consul for Greece in Manchester).

The bride, who was given away by her brother, Mr. Terence House, wore a graceful gown of ivory crepe de chine that hung in soft classic folds revealing a Grecian border embroidered in silver, Greek key pattern, with short train hanging from one shoulder, and thick silver rope girdle. A narrow wreath of tendrils of white heather and orange blossoms secured the long tulle veil, and the bridal bouquet was a huge posy of lilies of the valley tied with blue and white satin streamers, the Greek national colours.

Miss Betty Poulson was sole bridesmaid. She was a dainty little figure with a frilly frock of creamy Brussels net over shell pink crepe de chine. She wore a winged Dutch cap of lace and net with tiny pink roses and narrow ribbon. Instead of a bouquet, she wore slung on her arm a wreath composed of pink rose petals.
